A Brief History of the Dakota Conference

The Dakota Conference is the oldest and largest annual humanities conference in South Dakota. Founded by Dr. Ernest M. Teagarden, of Dakota State University, the Dakota History Conference was first held in 1969. Teagarden directed the conference through 1975. From 1976 until 1989, Professor Herbert Blakely, also of Dakota State University, directed the conference.

In 1988, when Dakota State University changed its academic focus from the liberal arts to computer technology, the Center for Western Studies of Augustana College offered to continue the conference, with grant support from the South Dakota Humanities Council. For five years, beginning with the 1990 conference, Professor Blakely and Dr. Harry F. Thompson, of the Center for Western Studies, served as co-directors, and in 1995 Thompson became conference director.

In its 16 years of sponsorship by the Center for Western Studies, the conference has grown into a regional and even national gathering of over 80 presenters from as many as 20 states, but it has always welcomed both professional and amateur scholars. Through its open submission policy, the Dakota Conference, sometimes called "the people's conference," encourages research and debate on issues affecting residents and institutions of the Northern Plains.

Two of the five conference awards are named in honor of participants who perished in a conference hotel fire in Madison, South Dakota, in 1980: Dr. Cedric Cummins, of the University of South Dakota's Department of History, and Richard Cropp, an amateur historian and artist from Mitchell, South Dakota. Three other awards honor Arthur I. and Willmeta Johnson, Herbert W. Blakely, and, beginning this year, Ernest M. Teagarden.
