Board Member Publishes Book

Former Augustana coach Sandy Jerstad has published Letters of Love: Sermons and Reflections by Mark and Sandy Jerstad. Mark Jerstad, who passed away in 1997, was Augustana's campus pastor from 1976 to 1985. Topics of faith and fear range from "What Happens After Death?" to "Forgiveness," from "Thinking about Thinking" to "Roadblocks to Faith."

Sandy has added real-life reflections that anchor Mark's sermons. Her stories of the hilarity, joy and adventure depict what living life with Mark was like. Readers will share with her a near-death experience, the perils of a solo 600-mile bike ride, her world of coaching, life in the South Dakota Senate, the death of her father and the difficult journey through Mark's dying and death.

At Augustana, Sandy coached tennis and volleyball for six years and softball for 27 years. Her softball team won the NCAA Division II title in 1991. Sandy is in the Augustana Hall of Fame, The South Dakota Sports Hall of Fame, and the National Fastpitch Coach's Hall of Fame. Sandy is a member of the CWS Board and continues to teach part-time at Augustana. Copies of the book are available in the CWS Gift Shop.

Consultant to Evaluate Art Collection

The Curator of Collections at the South Dakota Art Museum, Lisa Scholten, has begun working with the staff and board to evaluate the CWS art collection. Collection assessment is part of the threeyear Art Collection Initiative that **Executive Director Harry** Thompson proposed to develop an art collection policy. Board member and volunteer Stan Christopherson, with the assistance of Outreach and Promotion Director Tim Hoheisel, is heading up the initiative, which includes a survey of galleries and collectors.

Originally from Lyndhurst, Ohio, Lisa holds a B.S. degree from Ashland University and an M.S. degree from Ohio State University.



She has done additional coursework pursuant to a doctorate degree at Virginia Polytechnic Institute & State University in Blacksburg, Virginia. Lisa has experience as an educator, researcher, and museum curator. She was an Assistant Professor in the College of Family and Consumer Sciences at South Dakota State University for seven years. She has been with the South Dakota Art Museum since 1999. Lisa is the project director for a preservation grant from the NEH for collections at the Art Museum that document Native Americans.

Improving the Human Condition

▼ he Boe Trust directs the Center for Western Studies to invite individuals with singular knowledge to address topics of current worldwide or national concern and of broad public interest. In this way, Governor Boe believed that CWS would create a means of discussion about issues important to the people of the Northern Plains. Before it became the divisive topic it is today, the Boe Forum in 2003 examined health care in the United States. This year, responding to a request by the Co-curriculum Council to highlight the college's International Theme for 2011-2012, "World Hunger and Poverty," the Boe Forum Committee chose Mary Robinson, whose remarkable career has been devoted largely to advocacy for basic human rights for millions of people.

The 16th Boe Forum is widely considered to have been one of the most substantive and publicized forums, attracting an audience of over 2,000. As student Allie Hjerpe writes in the November 11, 2011 issue of The Augustana Mirror, "Robinson called attention to the acute existing—and impending consequences of greenhouse gasses and fossil fuel emissions on the impoverished nations of the world." The combination of a growing world population—now over 7 billion—and diminishing grazing land and fresh water for livestock will lead to even greater hunger and starvation, Robinson noted. Climate change alone will account for an additional one million child deaths from starvation in 2030. THROUGH FEBRUARY 25, 2012 Crossing the Threshold: Paintings and Prose Paintings by Sheila Agee and Prose by Ann Pederson

Where are we? The exhibit is a response to this question by artist Sheila Agee and writer Ann Pederson. This exhibition is intended to be a window for reflection on our place in the world. Places are like icons—the spiritual windows from which God looks into our world. Art is like that as well—revelations of the places we inhabit. During the development of this project, the artists felt like they were on a treasure hunt or a backpack. They wandered through the places Sheila has painted, even lingering in some for a while. Sometimes they stayed in the most

MARCH 5 - MAY 26, 2012 Interpretations of Wounded Knee 1973 and 1890 Art Show & Sale

On December 29, 1890, Miniconjou Lakota chief Spotted Elk (Big Foot) and some 300 of his followers were gunned down on the banks of Wounded Knee Creek. Eighty-

three years later, 200 Oglala Lakota seized and occupied the town of Wounded Knee, South Dakota, for 71 days.

The theme for the 44th Annual Dakota Conference is "Wounded Knee 1973: Forty Years Later." In observance of the 40th anniversary of the occupation of Wounded Knee in 1973, the Dakota Conference will address questions related to Wounded Knee 1973, the 1890 massacre, as well as any and all aspects of Northern Plains Indian history and culture.

The art exhibition, "Interpretations of Wounded Knee 1973 and 1890," will be displayed in conjunction with and during the Dakota Conference. This is a one-time art show intended to recognize the impact of these two events in Northern Plains, Indian, and American history.
