Augie's "new" media server

Augustana now has its own media server! To upload videos:

- 1. Go to <u>https://sho.augie.edu/admin</u> and log in with your regular username and password. (Note, it's a secure server, so you must use "https" rather than "http". Also, be sure to type "admin" at the end of the address. Otherwise, you'll just see a blank video player screen.)
- 2. Click "Add file".
- 3. Type a name for your file in the "Description" box. (Leave the default settings as they are, including leaving the "Encode to MP4" box checked.)
- 4. Browse for your video file.
- 5. Click "Upload".

Once you've uploaded your file, you'll see a green URL associated with it. That's the link to your video. You can copy and paste that link into Moodle or into a PowerPoint or Prezi. (Note: There is a 1Gb file upload limit and a 5Gb user quota.)

Multi-point videoconferencing (Be sure to consider the Internet connection and speed at the remote sites.)

- **Google Hangouts** <u>http://www.google.com/+/learnmore/hangouts/</u> Up to 10 can simultaneously video chat. Can record and save to your Google YouTube channel.
- **Skype** <u>http://www.skype.com</u> Free for one-to-one video calls. Up to 10 user video chat requires premium service, which costs from \$4.99/month.

Voice-over PowerPoints

You'll need to wait for the library to approve your account and then you should have access to the full features.)

- ✓ It's important to plan ahead.
- You might want to type what you need to say. You can then use that document as a transcript to increase accessibility for those with impaired hearing. If you are capturing yourself speaking using your laptop's webcam, you can open your transcript text, move it to the upper portion of your screen and read from that.
- ✓ Choose a good headset microphone. Expect to spend at last \$30.
- ✓ Practice starting and finishing (know what buttons you need to click and when.) Then, record a very short screencast to make sure everything is set the way you want it.

- Course orientation
- Narrated presentation
- Demonstration
- Technical tutorial
- Troubleshooting (Record steps you took that gave you that pesky error message and send screencast to the techies for them to troubleshoot!)

Video editors

- **IMovie**—comes free with any Mac but upgrades need to be paid for. Available in the Media Lab.
- FinalCut Pro Available in the Media Lab.

Video editors are similar with regard to the basics. They all will allow you to:

- ✓ Import—via camera or files
- ✓ Edit—choose the video you want in your movie and get rid of the rest
- ✓ Add transitions, titles, effects, voice-over
- ✓ Add music
- ✓ Share/Save/Burn

Handy apps

- *Handbrake*—Video converter—free download <u>http://sourceforge.net/projects/handbrake/</u> In case your video editor doesn't like the format of your video files. Windows and Mac versions available.
- **Audacity**—Audio editor—free download <u>http://audacity.sourceforge.net/download/</u> In case you need to do more to your audio than your video editor will allow you to. Windows and Mac versions available.
- DownloadHelper—Firefox extension—<u>http://www.downloadhelper.net/install.php</u>
 Detects videos playing in your browser and provides simple browser toolbar/menu interface to download the video directly to your local disk.

File formats—D&D (Down and Dirty)

- Common video formats—.mp4, .mov, . avi, .wmv, .mts (AVCHD-Advanced Video Coding High Definition)
- Some video editing software, including IMovie, won't accept .mts files (dragged to hard drive from AVCHD camcorders). It is best to import the video directly from the camcorder into the editing software. The editing software then performs its own conversion to a format it will accept.
- An alternative is to remove the files and convert them to .mp4 in *Handbrake*. Some video cameras save both types of files so you can decide how to use them. Here is a website if you are interested in more information on AVCHD files http://www.shedworx.com/hd-information/avchd.

Note: *Infrequently,* you might notice that your editing software accepts a specific file type (e.g. mp4) and then sometimes it won't. Here is one reason why...

Video file formats are actually containers. Within the container you'll find everything needed to view the video: streaming video, soundtrack, video and audio codecs, and menus. Codecs (coders-decoders) allow the video file to be compressed and uncompressed as you open it or share it, and there are a lot of different ones out there. So if the file uses an unacceptable codec your editing software might not like it. If this happens, try converting the file.
