





Dedicated to examining contemporary issues in their historical and cultural contexts, the Dakota Conference is a signature event of the Center for Western Studies, which provides programming in Northern Plains studies at Augustana College.

Returning to the multi-year theme of transportation, the 42nd Annual Dakota Conference examines paths, trails, roads, and highways that crisscross the Northern Plains and their impact on the lives of indigenous and immigrant peoples of this expansive land. Previous conferences on the theme of transportation considered railroads (2007) and rivers (2008). For 2010, presenters will discuss various forms of ground transportation, from moccasins to motorcycles, and also spiritual and metaphorical road journeys.

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Award for Distinguished Contribution to the Preservation of the Cultural Heritage of South Dakota and the Northern Plains

John E. Miller grew up in six small Midwestern towns and in a Chicago suburb. Since four of those towns were in Missouri, he says he's a "Missouri boy." His discovery of baseball at the age of ten bent him toward history, as he read about the St. Louis Cardinals in the *Post-Dispatch*, read baseball magazines from cover to cover, then biographies of famous baseball stars. Four years as a high school debater (graduating from Monett, Missouri, High School in 1962) sparked an interest in politics, and ever since his interest in history has worked its way backward from current events. Four years as a college debater (at the University of Missouri) reinforced his love of reading, discussion, analysis, argument, and wordplay.

His Ph.D. dissertation (at the University of Wisconsin) about Governor Philip F. La Follette, the Wisconsin Progressives, and the New Deal turned into his first book, after three summers spent in revising it. By that time, he was teaching history at South Dakota State University, where he remained for 29 years until shifting over full-time to researching and writing in 2003. His seven books include three on Laura Ingalls Wilder, a short textbook on South Dakota history used in most fourth grade classes in the state, and his favorite, *Looking for History on Highway 14*.

For the past ten years, on and off, he has been working on a book about small-town boys from the Midwest, and he has several other projects in the works. In the meantime, you can read his revealing essay about small-town life in *A New South Dakota History*, published by the Center for Western Studies. John has been a faithful attendee and supporter of the Dakota Conference, having presented more than 12 papers since 1990.

His wife, Kathy, is an elementary school counselor in Brookings. Their daughter, Ann, is a biochemist in Madison, Wisconsin, and their son, Tom, is a businessman in Chicago.


