Welcome, Dakota Conference Presenters and Attendees!

The Spanish were the first Europeans to explore and establish settlements on the Great Plains. Searching for the fabled cities of gold, Coronado pushed as far north as central Kansas in the 1540s. Two hundred years later, Villasur reached the Platte River in central Nebraska. At its zenith, in 1795, New Spain constituted most of the American West. Spanish fur trader Manuel Lisa established posts throughout the Northern Plains in the early 1800s.

Today, large Hispanic/Latino populations live in the Northern Plains, especially in Nebraska, Iowa, Minnesota, and Colorado. In metropolitan Sioux Falls, for example, the Hispanic/Latino population is now the largest minority, with more than 22,000 residents, most of whom come from Central America. For this year's conference, CWS is focusing on Spanish exploration of and Hispanic/Latino immigration to the Northern Plains.

As usual, many topics in addition to the conference theme will also be addressed. There will be panels on former South Dakota Senator James Abdnor, the past thirty years of political reporting in South Dakota, and South Dakota immigrant groups. An autograph party will also be held in conjunction with the conference on Saturday.

Dedicated to examining contemporary issues in their historical and cultural contexts, the Dakota Conference is a signature event of the Center for Western Studies, whose programming is focused on the Northern Plains region of the American West. Award for Distinguished Contribution to the Preservation of the Cultural Heritage of the Northern Plains





Wayne Fanebust was born in Sioux Falls, South Dakota, but raised in rural areas around Sioux Falls. He attended country schools through the elementary grades. Following graduation from Washington High School, he joined the United States Marine Corps and was stationed at Camp Pendleton, California.

Upon his discharge from the Marine Corps in 1964, he attended one semester at Augustana College. But music was in his blood, so in 1965, he moved to Los Angeles to pursue a career as a rock 'n roll musician and songwriter. As a guitar player he sang and performed in rock bands in Los Angeles in the 1960s.

While a student at the University of California, Santa Barbara, he developed an interest in history. A course he took, called "History of the American West," spurred

his fascination with the frontier experience and how it shaped the American character. He graduated with a degree in history from UCLA in 1973.

Wayne attended law school at Western State University College of Law in San Diego and received his Juris Doctor of Law degree. He was admitted to the California bar in 1980 and entered private practice in San Diego, where he maintained a law office until 1993, when he returned to Sioux Falls for a career change.

After fourteen years of work as a corporate attorney in Sioux Falls, he is now retired from professional life and is devoting himself to the business of writing. He is a regular participant in the Dakota Conference and is active in the Minnehaha County Historical Society.

His most recent book is *Major General Alexander M. McCook, USA: A Civil War Biography.* Other books include *Echoes of November: The Life and Times of Senator R. F. Pettigrew of South Dakota and Cavaliers of the Dakota Frontier.*
